Taking Her into Our Home



On New Year's Day, the atmosphere is filled not just with the sounds and sights of merriment but also with the polyphony of wishes for the year that begins. In all probability, people wish for success, prosperity, health of body, happiness and end of the pandemic.

In declaring the first day of the year as the World Day of Peace,

the Church reminds us of the fundamental need of human beings: peace. We need peace, more than other things. This, however, is not the peace that human beings establish, coming from the good will and intention to live in peace with one another. If it stands only on human efforts, peace is fragile. On the other hand, peace may not be one that is imposed by a superior power; if it is, it is not peace responding to our aspirations, but peace dictated from above.

The peace that we pray for on New Year's Day is the peace of God, given to human beings at the birth of his son Jesus, and first announced by the angelic choir to shepherds of Bethlehem. This is peace on earth from the good will of God; and since it has God for its source, it is peace that does not disappoint. Moreover, it is offered to everyone, not just to those people of good will. Peace is God's gracious gift, not some kind of reward for our human efforts.



The peace of God is not facile. It is the peace of the Messiah who became a contradiction. This contradiction led Jesus to the cross and caused the heart of Mary to be pierced by a sword. But

the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus are really the cause of this peace, and established him as Peace itself. St. Paul explains how Jesus became our peace: For he is our

peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is the hostility between us (Ephesians 2: 14).

The second grace the Church asks for God's people is the maternal protection of Holy Mary, the Mother of God. The first terms of endearment we experience in this world come from our mothers. On the spiritual level, this should also hold. We need the loving gaze of Mary, first directed to Jesus, as mentioned in the Gospel for today (Luke 2: 16-21).

Today's Solemnity honors Mary as the Mother of God to emphasize that Jesus whom she bore in her womb and to whom she gave her very humanity is both. Lord and God, equal to the Father and the Holy Spirit in power and glory. But Jesus has entrusted us to her from the cross where she became the mother of all believers. Our concern becomes hers too, as we read in the Gospel of St. John (19: 27): And from that hour the disciple took her into his own home ['concern', Greek 'eis ta idia']
